On 20 Oct 17, the 3rd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment became the 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment in a ceremony at the Marne Garden, Fort Stewart, as part of the transition of the 2nd Infantry Combat Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division to 2nd Armored Combat Brigade.

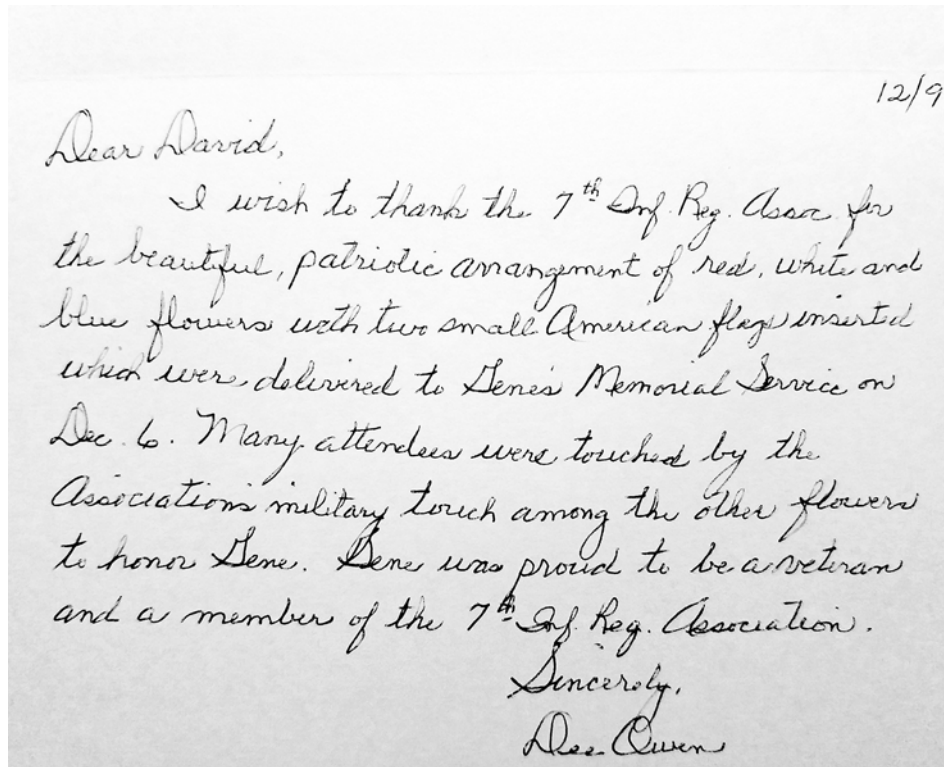

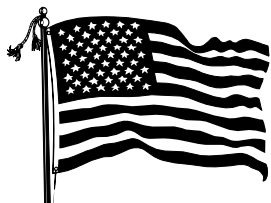

3rd Infantry Division's 2nd Brigade goes back to armored status

Inside the 3rd Infantry Division's garrison headquarters building at Fort Stewart, there are paintings and photos highlighting the legacy of its 2nd Brigade.

Especially notable are homages to "thunder runs" during the invasion of Iraq in 2003, when the brigade's tanks headed toward Baghdad.

But in 2015, the brigade — nicknamed the Spartan Brigade — was inactivated briefly and came back as a light infantry brigade. On Friday, that changed again. The Spartan Brigade is moving back to armor.

"The overmatch the U.S. Army has enjoyed for the last 70 years is closing quickly across all domains of warfare," Col. James Dooghan, the brigade's

commander, told his soldiers during a formal conversion ceremony Friday morning. "To keep pace, the Army continues to adapt its ways of thinking, executing and organizing. The battlefield of tomorrow will be more lethal than our generation has experienced, and the Army must change with that in mind. To ensure overmatch, the Army must modernize, train, and structure the force to build land-power capability against near-peer threats."

The division's other armored brigade, 1st Brigade, is currently at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, Calif., and the two brigades have been working together during the conversion, Dooghan said.

The 2nd Brigade will add more than 200 armored

vehicles as it transitions, including 87 tanks, as well as howitzers, and armored command and support vehicles, the Army announced last year. Fort Stewart's sprawling grounds make for an ideal training environment. The installation, which is the military's largest east of the Mississippi River, spans about 280,000 acres over five counties. All that space means there is a lot of room for training, even for live-fire exercises using tanks, heavy artillery and air support.

Dooghan says the move enhances the Army's overall ability to respond to situations in a changing world. "It also allows for having armored brigade combat teams in the 3rd Infantry Division to provide immediate ready companies, global response forces for 18th Airborne Corps, Forces Command and the nation," Dooghan said. On Friday, two of the brigade's units re-flagged. Third Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment is now 3rd Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, and 1st Battalion, 30th Infantry Regiment is

now 2nd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment.

Over the next few months, the brigade will be getting more heavy equipment in and training as it prepares for a Combat Training Center exercise.

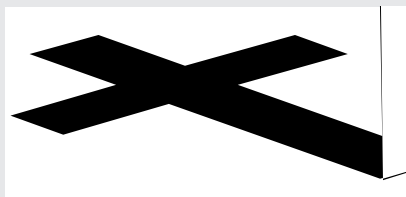
"Almost half of the brigade combat team has had to rotate in and out over the last eight months, and we'll continue to see some more personnel rotations, but right now we're on track to have everybody and everything that we need by our fielding dates," said Command Sgt. Maj. Michael McMurdy, the brigade's senior enlisted officer.

Dooghan says the brigade's soldiers will be ready for whatever type of mission is required.

"We're ready to execute whatever mission we're asked to do," he said. "If it is a counterinsurgency mission, if it is training other national forces, if it is a near-peer war that we have to engage in, we will be able to provide that." ♦
